## KOREA: "OUTLAWING" OF DEMOCRATS; U.N. COMMISSION

Kinen

After more than a month during which Radio Moscow has been concerned only with the contrast between the prosperity of the North and the poverty of the South, Soviet broadcasters this week resume their attack on the U.N. Commission and relay Radio Pyongyang's protests over the "outlawing" and arrest of thousands of Korean residents of Japan.

a. The U.N. Commission: Pietersky denounces signers of the final report of the U.N. Commission for their support of the Syngman Rhee Government and contends that this stand is opposed by "the Korean people" and by the "many" nations which have indicated their support of the Kim Il Sung regime. (in Korean, 19 September) The commentary includes the inevitable contrast between the "great economic and democratic progress" of the North and the depressed conditions of the South--conditions which are said to have been omitted from the Commission's report because it hopes to legalize the Rhee Government. The Commission is identified as a tool with which the United States hopes to enslave the Korean people.
